This Advent at St. Luke's

During this season of waiting and watching, St. Luke's Sunday worship will center around the old tradition of Morning Prayer, officiated from the chancels. This service has been said many times in this place, though it sounds a bit different today because we're using inclusive language for God and humanity, from *Enriching Our Worship I*.

Inclusive language won't be the biggest change we'll notice when comparing Advent 2020 with Advent seasons we've known before. This year, many of us will have more solitude and more time at home, with less pre-holiday bustling about. We may be more aware of darker days and longer nights. We may be more sensitive to the suffering of our neighbors, to scarcity of resources and a feeling of *lonely exile*. Some of us may need to ask for help.

All of that is in the spirit of the Advent season, when we are called to watch for signs of change emerging around us, and to prepare for the emergence that which is growing within, so that we can welcome, swaddle and tend the new life of God with us.


O Come, O Come, Emmanuel is a refrain as ancient as our practice of Morning Prayer. We are so glad <u>you</u> are with us in this time.

Hebrew Scripture

Isaiah 64:1-9

"From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place.
